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1.3. A brief overview of the institution under evaluation

According to the Self-Evaluation Report (SER), the University of Pristina, Faculty of Philosophy is the first academic unit of higher education in Kosovo. It was founded in 1960. The mission of Faculty is a proper education of the youth of Kosovo. It educates students to be worthy and useful citizens for the country. The Faculty of Philosophy has been the leader of many vital processes for Kosovo, despite the challenges it faced during its operation.

At the Faculty of Philosophy, there are seven departments:

- Department of History
- Department of Philosophy
- Department of Sociology
- Department of Psychology
- Department of Political Science
- Department of Social Work
- Department of Anthropology.

The mission of the Faculty of Philosophy is, through building and strengthening academic staff capacities, enriching the academic tradition with advanced European and international experiences and practices, through expanding cooperation, increasing professionalism, intensifying scientific research, as well as digitalisation of administration and all services for students, to become an academic institution at the level of prestigious international universities, with an emphasis on those of the European Union, as well as to be a serious competitor in the academic market, not only in the region but also beyond.

The goals of Faculty of Philosophy are:

- education and upbringing of students in the field of philosophy, sociology, psychology, history, political science, ethnology, archivist and social work;





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- theoretical-practical training of students in the above areas to perform the tasks and obligations for which they are prepared;
- affirmation and implementation of the best achievements in European and world culture and science in the Kosovar society, culture, science and economy;
- scientific research of social phenomena and processes in Kosovo society and beyond;
- cultivating critical and creative thinking in the field of scientific theory and social practice;
- preparation of human resources, for the application of theoretical and humanistic knowledge, in practical life and their training for competition in relevant fields;
- promoting values and civic democracy to the new generation;
- cooperation in teaching, research and publications with sister institutions at national, regionaland international level;
- creation of professionally capable and morally responsible staff for the exercise of important social, political and educational-scientific roles and functions in society;
- integration in the European Higher Education Area and achieving student and teacher mobility;
- the interconnection and interdisciplinary nature of the fields of study, within the Faculty of Philosophy and in cooperation with other faculties of the University of Pristina;
- the establishment of competent staff capable of solving theoretical and practical problems related to the Kosovar society, solutions that would contribute to the economic, social, democratic, cultural and educational prosperity of the Republic of Kosovo.

Faculty of Philosophy permanently monitors the developments, both in higher education and in the education market in Kosovo. This monitoring is done through a wide range of uses:

- formal and informal meetings with relevant senior decision-making and policy actors;
- taking part in conferences, seminars and roundtables on higher education in Kosovo, in the regionand beyond;
- formal and informal internal academic discussions of the staff of the Faculty of Philosophy;
- invitation for public lectures at the Faculty of Knowledge on Education and other related issues;
- monitoring of prestigious scientific journals for relevant findings to higher education and monitoring of the daily press for articles and analysis dedicated to higher education;
- monitoring in continuity the developments of other levels of education, in order to adapt and advance curricula, academic materials, teaching methodologies and evaluation.

The Faculty of Philosophy has 6 programmes with valid accreditation, 6 MA programmes, as well as 3 programmes at the BA level in the process of accreditation, or re-accreditation.

The Faculty of Philosophy is located on the university campus, close to the National Library of Kosovo, the University Library, the Rectorate of the University of Pristina.



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2. PROGRAMME EVALUATION

2.1. Mission, Objectives and Administration

In the SER, the mission of the Bachelor degree of Sociology study programme is described as teaching skills on the essential concepts and competencies, including the ability to make an empirically based argument to collect and analyse data and communicate it effectively. The programme is characterised by a distinct methodological aiming at "centring the programme on context as well as emphasising the importance of producing researched based knowledge".

At the general level of information provided, the mission of the study programme is in compliance with the overall mission statement of the Faculty of Philosophy and the University of Pristina. In talking to the heads of the study programme and representatives of employers of graduates and external stakeholders, the expert team noticed that graduates are properly prepared to work in schools as well as in a variety of fields such as media world, politics, civil society. They are also well prepared for continuing MA level studies. The administrative and academic staff is enthusiastic and ready to implement recommendations. The management is proactive with the private sector and sends students to do their internships (media houses, NGO-s, schools, etc.). The representatives of media house, research Institute and social network at the meeting confirmed good cooperation with the Department of Sociology and expressed readiness to involve teachers and students in their future plans and projects as well.

Regarding the consistency of the programme with the National Qualifications Framework and the Framework for Qualifications of the European Higher Education Area, it meets the main criteria. But it should also be noted that the SER does not contain more detailed evidence-based information nor was this issue elaborated in detail during the site visit. In particular, no explicit formulations were offered which would link the intended learning outcomes of the programme to specific level descriptors relevant to the programme.

With regard to the didactic and research concept, the SER contains general statements on didactical approaches and research activities. The study programme provides a well-defined overarching didactic concept. It also trains to create professional and intellectual capacities, capable of taking civic responsibility on social processes.



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Formal policies, guidelines and regulations dealing with recurring procedural and academic issues are described in the SER. During the site visit, the faculty management and heads of the programme stressed several times the importance of and their adherence to transparency rules.

During the site visit, the expert team gained the impression that a good level of compliance with internal regulations relating to ethical conduct in research, teaching and assessments in most of the relevant areas has been achieved. Code of Ethics is established for academic and administrative staff and students. Continuous evaluation of students and academic staff is an important feature in the implementation of the study programme. The academic staff confirmed that there is no appropriate programme for checking graduate theses against plagiarism.

Several review processes and regulation mechanisms responsible for evaluating policies in different time frames are mentioned in the SER and discussed during the site visit. Department of Sociology holds regular meetings and at least once a year holds an extended meeting (at the end of the academic year), where it discusses various issues related to the programme implementation, terms of reference, regulations, statements of responsibility.

ET recommendations:

- Fulfilment of evaluation standards should be substantiated through evidence-based, empirically testable statements.
- Institutional structure and reward system should support quality teaching as well as faculty research careers.

2.2. Quality Management

The SER contains a description of how quality management at the university works and which instruments it contains. During the conversation with the QA staff, the expert team was informed that the below listed practises are implemented.

- Quality management is integrated into the life cycle of the programme.
- For assessing the quality of programmes and services, the Senate approved three sets of measuring instruments: questionnaires for academic staff, questionnaires for administrative staff, and questionnaires for students.
- At the end of each semester through anonymous feedback forms, students assess the teaching and learning process for each course.
- From the academic year 2021/2022, quality assessment questionnaire has become mandatory and is conducted at the end of each semester.
- A process for ongoing strategy improvement has been developed.
- Department of Sociology has regular meetings. At least once a year, it holds an extended meeting (at the end of the academic year), where it discusses various issues related to the programme implementation, terms of reference, regulations, statements of responsibility.
- The Department makes plans for the improvement of its programme in accordance with the Statute of UP and its accompanying legislation.

QA revised comprehensively learning outcomes together with the faculty.

The Department of Sociology ensures that it continuously respects all the criteria set by the KAA regarding the quality component. Consequently, it has respected the recommendations



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required to achieve the standards by international accreditation experts in every accreditation and re-accreditation.

The electronic system enables an evaluation, which can deliver the results promptly.

While it was stated in the SER that evaluation and planning for improvement processes are integrated into the normal planning processes, no detailed evidence has been provided on how this is achieved practically and on which concepts or methodologies the quality assurance system is based on.

The expert team was informed that the low percentage of students participating in the survey (due to lack of willingness to respond to the questionnaires, lack of seriousness in filling out questionnaires, etc.) does not show real quality assessment results. Therefore, from this academic year, questionnaires are made mandatory to have more data to collect and analyse.

The academic staff is sometimes not sufficiently informed about the results of student evaluations of their teaching.

A specific COVID19 impact evaluation was not conducted.

ET recommendations:

- 1. Given that mandatory evaluation questionnaires have been introduced from the current academic year, it is recommended that a detailed and in-depth analysis of such a procedure should be made in several cycles.
- 2. Discussion of the course evaluation results with the students.
- 3. Publication of evaluation results from the general surveys. Summary of these results for the public. In particular, make clear what changes have been brought about by evaluation results.
- 4. Establishment of alumni tracking and the corresponding integration into institutionalised surveys.

2.3. Academic Staff

The academic staff employed in the Department of Sociology, within which this programme is implemented, carries out their full time (FT) activity in full compliance with the statutory provisions. The regular staff is engaged for lectures.

Over 60% of the academic staff in the Sociology are full-time employees and full-time staff of the Faculty of Philosophy. All academic staff acts in accordance with legal requirements.

The cooperation within the University of Pristina offers possibilities for staff development. Elements and processes for an academic career are sufficiently described in the SER.

The small number of professional staff in the Department causes teacher overload. On the one hand, this limits their professional development. On the other hand, it also affects the quality of teaching.

In addition, as confirmed in an interview during the on-site evaluation, some lecturers will soon be leaving the faculty. Therefore, it is necessary to hire new teachers in order to be able to carry out and develop this study program to high international educational standards. Otherwise, the academic staff will be deprived of certain opportunities for further professional development if there are not enough full-time teachers (Standard 3.6).

In the SER the Faculty of Philosophy describes the typical academic activities sufficiently. However, the number of published papers of academic staff could be improved. The reasons for the current situation can be explained by several factors. First, pandemic conditions and increased pressure on teachers to teach online should be considered. But on the other hand, the lecturers confirmed in conversation with the expert team that there are not enough funds for the professional development of academic staff (Standard 3.7).

ET recommendations:

- 1. Academic staff needs to participate more in research by reducing teaching loads.
- 2. The development of academic staff should be enabled through financial support for greater participation in international conferences and scientific events.
- *3. Academic staff should be stimulated to publish more.*
- 4. It needs to be recognised and rewarded successful teaching practices and research.

2.4. Educational Process Content

The curriculum covers a broad range of qualifications required to work as bachelor of sociology in public institutions, large private enterprises and in the field of civil society. As an undergraduate programme it is oriented towards both theoretical and practical courses and contents. The study programme's focus is clear. The central aspect of the programme is to



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enable students to teach sociology and related subjects in schools as well to work in different areas of social life. The programme also aims to develop specific basic skills through different practicum courses, where students design and conduct various research projects and present their findings publicly. In recent years, students have presented their research work in local media. They are part of various local and international organisations, such as Centre for Gender Studies, Kosovo2.0, CEL, Foundation 17, GAP Institute, Britmi Institute etc.

The study programme is in line with the National Qualifications Framework and the Qualifications Framework of the European Higher Education Area. The study methods are described in the syllabuses for each course. In general, the programme focuses on problemsolving skills, case studies, project work, problem-based learning, and simulated learning. Regarding the teaching methodology, all courses include innovative and creative teaching techniques, such as PowerPoint presentations, close reading of academic articles, screening of films/documentaries, and inviting guest lecturers. In addition, in specific courses, students are encouraged to conduct research projects in the form of community interventions. Practical work is part of courses: Quantitative Methods, Qualitative Methods, Sociological Practicum, Gender Studies, Sociology of Culture, and Public Sociology. For this reason and due to other technical, administrative, and ethical implications (payment, etc.), practical work is not included as a separate course in the programme.

The programme's focus provides a logical flow and leads to the development of general and specific learning outcomes in the curriculum. The programme offers elective courses for individual student focus.

Syllabuses of the curriculum are well documented. The structure of the syllabi is standardised and sufficiently described by the faculty staff members. The programme meets the European standards required by the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology of Kosovo and the Kosovo Accreditation Agency.

The foreign language skills are not regulated by the Faculty of Philosophy. Students are expected to have intermediate knowledge of the English language. Part of the study and examination literature is given in foreign languages. However, there is no prescribed method of testing knowledge or training students in foreign languages.

Teaching strategies consist of different teaching methods described and customised for the courses and documented in the syllabuses.





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All courses of the programme respect the defined practices to provide an evaluation that promotes learning and evaluates the achievements of students in comparison to the expected results with valid and reliable grades. An overall assessment monitoring is established, which generates a report for every assessment.

The Programme does not mandate internships. Internships are done on a voluntary basis. Though, so far, the majority of students take on internships based on the recommendation of the Department.

The Department of Sociology has an experience cooperating with institutions, organisations and practical training units. Representatives of employers in the interview during the visit confirmed that they have concluded internship contracts.

ET recommendations:

1. ET encourages the Faculty of Philosophy to test the foreign language knowledge of students during the first and second semester and help them with additional literature in their domestic language if the students' knowledge is not sufficient.

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- 2. ET recommends that funding be provided within the Faculty or University for the updated literature on specific sociological subjects as well as for the translation of key literature into Albanian.
- 3. ET recommends that for the study of sociology, as one of the basic and unique studies at the University of Pristina, a doctoral procedure be initiated in order to complete the educational cycle according to the Bologna system.

2.5. Students

The evaluation process has confirmed the presence of information, outside the documents supplied in advance of the visit, that demonstrate institution-wide arrangements for student admissions, rights of representation, student feedback via 'satisfaction surveys', what students can expect during the studies, what is expected of them and what support can be provided if something goes wrong.

At the beginning of each academic year, within the general competition of the University of Pristina for the admission of new students, the competition for this programme will be announced. The competition will contain complete information about the competition, evaluation, and admission procedure in the Bachelor of Sociology study programme. After the official announcement of the results of the entrance test, students have the right to appeal which are reviewed by the entrance examination commission within the Department of Sociology.

Assessment mechanisms are based on the Bologna charter. Students' academic performance is evaluated in various forms and systematically. After each assessment, students have the opportunity to review and discuss their work with their teachers, during consultations hours. All classes have mandatory intermediate exam, grades and detailed feedback are provided to students. Grades are calculated as follows:

The Faculty of Philosophy established different regulations to deal with academic misconduct, including plagiarism and other forms of cheating: Code of Ethics for Academic Staff, Code of Ethics for Students, Code of Ethics for Non-Academic Staff. The Faculty of Philosophy does not have a plagiarism detection software, but they control the paper handed by students very strictly.

ET recommendations:

- 1. The Faculty of Philosophy is recommended to establish a system and effective procedures to ensure that work submitted by students is original.
- 2. It is recommended to introduce additional courses in the first semesters for students who do not have enough pre-university education.

2.6. Research

The Faculty of Philosophy has the Development strategy 2018-2023 and the Action plan for the implementation of the Strategy. Research objectives and the dynamics of the realisation of the activities in the achievement of the objectives are defined with these strategic documents. In terms of financial, logistical and human resources the Department of Sociology makes regular requests for additional resources. The decision for them is made at the central level of the university. The staff and the Department mainly provide funding for research projects from donors or in application to various international and local grants. Experienced staff in this regard supports the youngest staff in compiling and developing research projects. The staff of the Department of Sociology during the years 2019 to 2021 is involved in three international research projects and has one research grant from US embassy for research. Students are involved in all these projects.

However, it should be noted that the potential researches that could be undertaken for certain modules of this curriculum are limited due to poor financial support. The expert team was informed during the site visit that national budget lines for scientific research funding are almost non-existent. It is therefore recommended that the Faculty of Philosophy and the University of Pristina advocate a more substantial allocation for science at the national level.

The issue of promotion of teaching staff is regulated through a mandatory requirement for scientific research and publication in journals with international credibility. The Statute of the

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University of Pristina sets the criteria for staff evaluation and promotion. Finishing studies and research activities and publishing them in internationally recognised and credible scientific journals serve as an evaluation of staff performance. Department staff participate regularly to the scientific sessions, symposiums, conferences and round tables which are of interest for the profession and the community.

The overview of the scientific publications of the academic staff of the Department of Sociology for the last 5 years shows that the research results could be increased. Some of the research papers are older than 3 or even more years. The expert team highly recommends publishing research papers frequently and proposes not only to request it from the University of Pristina but also to apply for funds from other sources. Publishing research papers is something that spreads and enhances the knowledge of professors and is also useful for the education of students.

Students are engaged in research projects. Many studies have so far been done in collaboration with students due to the lack of funding for studies at the national level. However, their engagement is within professional and human considerations, as students cannot engage in dimensions that normally require financial compensation, though their contributions are translated as a constitutive part of the final evaluation of their performance.

The expert team encourages the Faculty of Philosophy to improve capacities for requesting national and international research grant applications.

- 1. Faculty of Philosophy should improve capacities for requesting national and international research grant applications.
- 2. It is recommended that the staff publishes more scientific papers.
- 3. Establishing a strategy for publishing papers.
- 4. *ET recommends having a strategy for applying for research funds.*

2.7. Infrastructure and Resources

The evaluation of infrastructure and resources was made based on the information received from the SER and the information declared by the participants in the meetings during the online accreditation. According to these sources, it seems that the space is appropriate for the development of educational activities. The Faculty of Philosophy contains classrooms, a



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reading room, library, working cabinets for the teaching staff, labs, wide classrooms equipped with computers, also suitable for socialising.

There would only be a recommendation to explore the possibility of opening a cafeteria or space where students and teachers could socialise informally.

However, the information gathered shows that the internet connection in the teaching rooms which facilitates the process of teaching is flawed. It was also mentioned that access to electronic platforms, for students in order to use relevant literature, then special software programmes for analysing data in the field of social sciences is limited.

The students have explained during the site meeting that they use a library at the faculty and one which is located within a two-minute walk from the faculty. The faculty library has over 11,000 copies catalogued by departments. In general, the literature available at the faculty library meets the curriculum needs of existing programmes. However, the information in the SER shows that the faculty library is no longer connected to any regional or European library network and as a consequence the students do not have the opportunity to use online literature.

It should be noted that the building of the faculty is suitably adapted for students with physical disabilities. The three floors of building are accessible by elevator. The ground floor and the main entrance are accessible by all equipment of persons with special needs. On the ground floor, the sanitary nodes are equipped with toilets for persons with special needs.

There is a videoconferencing equipment for streaming video lectures. Adequate computer equipment is available and accessible for teaching, staff and students throughout the institution, and technical support is available for staff and students using information and communications technology

During the meetings with the management, students, and the staff, the ET found out that the institution provides an adequate and well-maintained physical environment for its students and staff. Adequate computer equipment is available and accessible for staff and students throughout the institution, and technical support is available for staff and students using information and communications technology.

It should be noticed at the end a lack of recreational spaces for staff and students within the campus.

3. FINAL RECOMMENDATION OF THE ET

The ET would like to commend the Dean, the Faculty management, the heads of the study programme, the academic staff, the employers and external stakeholders, the students and the graduates of the Faculty of Philosophy Department of Sociology for the well-prepared online meetings during the site visit as well as for their open discussion on issues raised in the evaluation.

The ET finds that the objectives of the Sociology BA study programme are well defined and are in full harmony with the mission of the Faculty of Philosophy and the University of Pristina. Graduates are properly prepared to work in schools as well as in a variety of fields such as media world, politics, civil society. They are also appropriately educated for continuing MA level studies. The administrative and academic staff is enthusiastic and ready to implement any recommendations. The management is proactive with the private sector and sends students to do the internships in media houses, civil sector, schools, etc.

The learning outcomes are at a decent level as far as the expert team opinion is considered. The programme meets well the criteria of the National Qualifications Framework and the Qualifications Framework in the European Higher Education Area. The academic references and network are well elaborated. The study programme provides a well-defined overarching didactic concept. It also trains to create professional and intellectual capacities, capable of taking civic responsibility on social processes.

In addition to these and other positive achievements, there are some minor shortcomings in the implementation of the study programme, that the expert team points out. The main two

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shortcomings stand out: overburdening of academic staff with teaching activities due to lack of the teaching staff in general, and insufficient financial support for the research.

The ET recommends to the Faculty, University and Government of Kosovo to establish regularly support of the scientific research. It will be crucial for the future development of the study programme to use and concentrate the teaching resources in order to acquire the necessary financial means to tie the academic staff in a sustainable manner. Faculty members who are receiving research funds have to be financially and institutionally awarded for their scientific achievements. They have to be able to take sabbaticals and to devote themselves to their research. The ET recommends that teaching staff should be rewarded for their publications with greater international visibility.

The ET recommends increasing support allocations for organising public events to stimulate public debates on sociological issues and to promote the study programme of BA in Sociology. For achieving greater publicity about departmental research activities, it is recommended that a separate faculty home page with research section, identifying priority research directions for each programme is created. Information about student opportunities for applying for independent research grants and funds from the external donors should be included into the same dedicated area.

The ET recommends to the Faculty of Philosophy as an important task to further improve the level of the foreign language knowledge by the students participating in the study programme Sociology. In this respect could be highly recommended to the Faculty of Philosophy to cooperate intensively with the Faculty of Philology to improve the foreign languages competence of students as well as of the teaching staff. It is recommended that every student should be obliged to attend at least one or two courses which are taught in foreign languages during a BA-programme. If every BA-thesis has to include a foreign language summary, such measures would help to improve the language skills.

Among the innovations of the Sociology BA study programme, the ET especially wants to praise the introduction of the subject Sociology of Sports. This should be an incentive for the Faculty of Philosophy to introduce certain forms of sports and recreational content in its studies, as the established practice at European and American universities.

Final finding



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The Bachelor of Science in Sociology study programme, offered by the University of Pristina, Faculty of Philosophy as such and the given infrastructure as verified on the online site visit as well as in the examination of the documents, is fully compliant with the standards included in the KAA Accreditation Manual.

Final recommendation

The expert team recommends to the KAA to accredit the Sociology BA study programme for a duration of 5 years with 100 students per year to be enrolled on the programme.
