
THE BOLOGNA PROCESS

 - mobility for students and staff



QA IN THE EHEA


- They set a common framework for quality assurance systems for learning and teaching at European, national and institutional level;

- They support mutual trust, thus facilitating recognition and mobility within and across national borders;
- They provide information on quality assurance in the EHEA.

The development of higher education quality assurance systems has been one of the **most** significant features and drivers of change in the EHEA.



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



MEMBER AGENCIES (56 IN 31 COUNTRIES)



- → Membership is open to quality assurance bodies in the field of higher education
- that are conducting quality assurance activities as understood in the ESG,
- are located in an EHEA member state, and
- act in compliance with the membership criteria.



AFFILIATES (49 IN 29 COUNTRIES)



- Affiliation is open to bodies that do not wish to, or are unable to, apply to become
 members, bona fide quality assurance agencies or other organisations (excluding
 higher education institutions) with a demonstrable involvement in the quality
 assurance of higher education.
- Affiliates have access to ENQA's activities and services but can't participate in ENQA's governance mechanisms.

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MISSION

- As the designated stakeholder organisation of quality assurance agencies in the EHEA, ENQA:
 - represents their interests internationally
 - supports them nationally and
 - provides them with comprehensive services and networking opportunities. ENQA
 is a key source of reliable information, expertise and know-how on QA.
- Under ENQA's umbrella, the community of agencies **drive innovation** in quality assurance and refines quality assurance processes. ENQA monitors changes in the higher education landscape and is a guarantor of knowledge-based development of external quality assurance.

VISION

• An EHEA where persistently **high-quality education** contributes to responsible and active **European citizens** in democratic and sustainable societies, where **access** is attainable for all, and where graduates acquire a broad **knowledge** base on which to build regionally and globally rewarding **careers** while inspiring their **personal development**.

- Dissemination of information on experiences, good practice and new developments in the field of QA to members and other stakeholders
 - o aiming to keep members and affiliates updated and raise awareness and public trust regarding the role of quality assurance;
 - mainly through participation in different events, newsletters, social media and the website, where updated information on ENQA's activities and projects and many relevant resources in the field of QA are available.
- Leadership development program
 - intensive European peer-learning experience for high-potential professional staff in member and affiliate quality assurance agencies.
- ENQA is organising different **events** for the members Members' Forum, seminars and webinars on QA, and participates in organising the European Quality Assurance Forum (**EQAF**), the most important QA conference in the EHEA. The next edition will take place in Portugal in November, and the call for contributions is open by **2 October 2023**.

- ENQA is also coordinating or being a partner in different **projects**, and this activity is essential for developing various tools, studies or policies in the quality assurance field and supporting the quality assurance agencies in achieving their goals or collaborating on themes of common interest.
 - on the future of European QA (QA-FIT);
 - support of Bologna TPG C on QA (<u>IMINQA</u>);
 - support for ESG alignment (<u>SEQA-ESG II</u>).
- Participation in policy making
 - Consultative member in the Bologna Follow-up Group since 2005 and member to different working structures (fundamental values, T&L, global dialogue, TPG C)
 - Co-operation within E4 (EUA, ESU, EURASHE)
 - Dialogue with the European Commission

- Within working groups are being developed policies on areas of interest for the members
 - the current ones are working on QA of micro-credentials and the role of QA in academic integrity
 - a new one was just established in the field of QA of research
 - Past themes: e-learning, recognition, excellence, lifelong learning, impact of QA.
- <u>Publication</u> of **reports** and **policy papers** (quality procedures, accreditation models, terminology of quality assurance, stakeholders involvement, qualification frameworks, IQA, learning outcomes, diploma supplement, transnational HE, cross-border QA, trends in QA, joint programmes, etc.)



- ENQA also maintains links with other quality assurance networks to enhance cooperation with other regions of the world and to ensure that ENQA's members benefit from exchange of practice.

ACTIVITIES AGENCY REVIEWS - PURPOSE

ENQA membership

- An external review against the ESG is a prerequisite to become a member of ENQA / for renewal of membership (every 5 years).
- To be eligible, the agency should have been operational in quality assurance for at least 2 years and should have completed at least 5 review reports.

EQAR registration

- An external review against the ESG is also a requirement for agencies wishing to apply to the European Quality Assurance Register for Higher Education (EQAR)
- ENQA Agency Reviews also comply with EQAR's requirements for external reviews.

ACTIVITIES AGENCY REVIEWS - PURPOSE


 All reviews – whether first, second, or subsequent or full/targeted – must always have a developmental approach and aim at constant enhancement of the agencies so that they could perform fit-for-purpose external quality assurance activities.






ACTIVITIES AGENCY REVIEWS



QUALITY CULTURE



- Quality assurance and quality enhancement are thus inter-related. They can support the development of a *quality culture* that is **embraced by all**: from the students and academic staff to the institutional leadership and management.
- The ESG are based on the following four principles for quality assurance in the EHEA:
 - ✓ Higher education institutions have primary responsibility for the quality of their provision and its assurance;
 - ✓ Quality assurance responds to the diversity of higher education systems, institutions, programmes and students;
 - ✓ Quality assurance supports the development of a quality culture;
 - ✓ Quality assurance takes into account the **needs and expectations** of students, all other stakeholders and society.

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QUALITY CULTURE



1.1 Policy for quality assurance

Standard:

Institutions should have a policy for quality assurance that is made public and forms part of their strategic management. Internal stakeholders should develop and implement this policy through appropriate structures and processes, while involving external stakeholders.

Guidelines:

Policies and processes are the main pillars of a coherent institutional quality assurance system that forms a cycle for continuous improvement and contributes to the accountability of the institution. It supports the development of quality culture in which all internal stakeholders assume responsibility for quality and engage in quality assurance at all levels of the institution. In order to facilitate this, the policy has a formal status and is publicly available.
